
# **Background**

- Disparities in research and innovation performance: barrier to competitiveness, growth and jobs across Europe
- Some countries experience low participation in the EU Framework Programmes because of:
  - insufficient national R&D investments
  - lack of synergies between national research systems and the EU research landscape
  - system learning effects
  - reduced access to international networks
  - problems with information, communication and training





# FP7 country participation





## Specific eligibility criteria for WIDENING

- Particular political objectives of WIDENING in H2020
- Necessitate a <u>targeted approach</u> to help those participants with low performance in R&I
- H2020 legal text >>"low performing RDI Member States and regions"

#### **Eligibility Criterion:** The Composite Indicator of Research Excellence

> Threshold: MS below 70% of the EU average

#### "Low RDI Performing" or "Widening" Countries:

MS: Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia

AC: Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Faroe Islands, Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Moldova, Montenegro, Serbia, Turkey and Ukraine



## The Widening Package under H2020

Measures in Horizon 2020 under **Spreading Excellence and Widening Participation:** 

- Teaming (institution building)
- Twinning (institutional networking)
- ERA Chairs (bringing excellence to institutions)
- NCPs (information, communication, support)
- Policy Support Facility (support for R&I Policy design)
- COST (stimulating cross border science networks)

Total Budget in H2020 ~ € 800 million


Building in-house evaluation culture

- Very few projects completed (~0.6% of budget committed)
- Data availability & quality, lack of impact indicators
- >Time-lags for R&I impacts





# WHERE WE STAND APPLICANTS, PROPOSALS AND SIGNED GRANTS




~75,000 applicants submitted over 100,000 proposals requesting EUR ~173 billion

~11,000 grants were signed for ~EUR 20 billion



Overall success rate was 11.6%



Less than 1 in 4 high-quality proposals could be funded



#### **KEY FINDINGS: EFFICIENCY**



#### ON TRACK TO BE MORE EFFICIENT THAN FP7

- Administrative expenditure below the 5% legal target
- Time-to-grant 110 days faster than FP7





- Participants from over 130 countries
- 52% of participants are **newcomers**; more of them come from EU-13 (31.2%) than EU-15 (19.7%)



#### LARGE-SCALE OVERSUBSCRIPTION

- Success rate only 11.6% (vs. 18.4% in FP7)
- ~EUR 1.7 billion spent to write unsuccessful proposals






#### **KEY FINDINGS: COHERENCE**

# INCREASED COHERENCE WITH OTHER INITIATIVES

- With Structural Funds: e.g. through the <u>Seal of Excellence</u>
- Structuring effect: e.g. through ERC quality label & Teaming
- R&I: engine to implement the Sustainable Development Goals







#### **EFFICIENCY: ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**



Over EUR 60 billion more needed to fund all high quality proposals.



Comprehensiveness of **evaluation feedback** is a concern.



**International cooperation** should be further increased.



Low participation from EU-13, but improving over time.





# Update on Teaming following the 2016 Phase 1 call

Phase 1 Call: Business Plan for a Centre of Excellence (CoE)

Budget: €12 million

<u>Call deadline</u>: 15 November 2016

Project Size: €400,000 (eligibility condition)
Project Duration: 12 months (eligibility condition)

Results announced: March 2017

Start date of all projects: September 2017

#### Phase 2 (Restricted) Call in 2018: Start-up/Implementation of the CoE

<u>Project size & duration</u>: ~ €15 million & 5-7 years

<u>Funding for</u>: Substantial support for the start-up phase of the CoE (administrative, personnel and operational costs as well as very limited support for equipment and consumables)

# Commission's position on low remuneration of researchers in Widening countries

- Commission reimburses personnel costs at level of normal salaries in national systems.
- A long-term sustainable solution to the researchers' salary divide can only be national reforms to provide for possibilities at national level to reward excellent researchers.
- In the short-term, the Horizon 2020 model grant agreement (AGA) has been revised:
  - It clarifies that the level of personnel costs paid in national projects would be considered as basic remuneration, so that the capping of €8000 would apply only to bonuses above this.
  - This change will have a retroactive effect to all ongoing signed H2020 grants.
